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Executive Summary

The survey was carried out with meticulous care, and a diverse group of women, representing various age groups and backgrounds within Chandra Village, which is again divided into three small parts; Barchandra, Majuchandra and Soruchandra; were selected for participation. This allowed for a comprehensive understanding of the unique socio-economic challenges faced by women in this rural setting. The findings of this study illuminate both the areas where progress has been made and the persistent challenges that need attention. The report highlights disparities in education, employment, and access to healthcare services, which demand a targeted and multifaceted approach to improve the socio-economic status of women in Barchandra Village. By recognizing these challenges and opportunities, this report aims to provide actionable recommendations for local authorities, non-governmental organizations, and the broader community to collaborate on initiatives that will empower women, enhance their well-being, and ultimately lead to the development of a more inclusive and equitable society. INTRODUCTION

> Background

Nestled in the heart of Assam, Chandra Village stands as a microcosm of cultural diversity and historical richness. According to Census 2011 information the location code or village code of Chandra village is 303367. Chandra village is located in North Guwahati subdivision of Kamrup district in Assam, India. It is situated 6km away from sub-district headquarter North Guwahati (tehsildar office) and 12km away from district headquarter Amingaon. As per 2009 stats, Rudeswar is the gram panchayat of Chandra village. The total geographical area of village is 198.65 hectares. Chandra has a total population of 994 peoples, out of which male population is 493 while female population is 501. Literacy rate of Chandra village is 82.49% out of which 86.21% males and 78.84% females are literate. There are about 218 houses in Chandra village. Pincode of Chandra village locality is 781030.Guwahati is nearest town to Chandra for all major economic activities, which is approximately 32km away. The village's history is intertwined with the tapestry of Assam's heritage, which reflects a rich blend of traditions, languages, and customs. Chandra is a testament to the tapestry of Assamese culture.

Socio-Economic Diversity

Within the geographical confines of Chandra Village, one encounters similar communities, each with its own unique socio-economic context. The socio-economic disparities among these communities, however, are stark and undeniable. While some parts of the village has witnessed progress and development over the years, others continue to grapple with poverty and limited access to opportunities. In this backdrop of diversity and disparity, the experiences of women in Chandra Village vary widely, reflecting the broader socio-economic conditions they are born into.

Survey Travel Log

On 14th October 2023, the event took place as a part of our survey activity. On this date, a group of dedicated West Guwahati College of Education teacher trainees/students, under the guidance of our faculty teachers and Principal – Dr Gitanjali Choudhury Ma'am, embarked on a journey to reach Chandra Village. This journey commenced with a ferry ride across the mighty Brahmaputra River, taking us from the southern region to the northern part of Guwahati which set sale at sharp 9:20 am.

As the ferry gently traversed the river's expanse, the weather on that day was notably characterized by cloudy skies. A sense of calm and peace prevailed in the atmosphere, allowing for reflection and anticipation of the experiences that awaited us in the village.

Upon docking at the port on the northern side, our students continued their journey, traveling in battery-driven rickshaws to reach the destination, Chandra Village. The scenic journey through this mode of transportation not only facilitated our arrival but also offered a glimpse of the picturesque landscapes that make up the local surroundings. This venture allowed us to not only collect data but also to immerse ourselves in the cultural and environmental tapestry of the region. The experiences of that day, from crossing the Brahmaputra River to arriving in the village, were instrumental in grounding our survey within the lived realities and natural rhythms of this rural setting.

By incorporating these unique experiences and moments into our survey period, we aimed to align our data collection with the rhythms of life and nature in Chandra Village, fostering a deeper and more empathetic understanding of the community.

Methodology

Sampling Strategy

To ensure a representative sample, a rigorous sampling strategy was employed. Women from 30 houses surveyed were carefully selected to encompass the diversity present within Barchandra Village. This diversity was not limited to age groups but also considered socio-economic backgrounds, ethnicities, and other relevant factors. The objective was to provide an accurate reflection of the complex socio-economic landscape within the village.

> Data Collection

Data collection was conducted through a multi-faceted approach, recognizing the importance of multiple data sources:

- **Structured Questionnaires**: A standardized questionnaire was designed to capture quantitative data. The questions covered various aspects such as education, employment, health, and family dynamics.
- **One-on-One Interviews**: In addition to structured questionnaires, one-on-one interviews were conducted to gather qualitative data. This approach allowed participants to provide in-depth insights into their personal experiences, challenges, and aspirations.
- **On-Site Observations**: Field observations were conducted to understand the local context better. These observations included visits to schools, healthcare centers, and areas of economic activity within the village. These visits helped in corroborating and contextualizing the data collected through questionnaires and interviews.

Data Analysis

The collected data underwent a rigorous analysis process, combining qualitative and quantitative methods:

- Quantitative Analysis: For structured questionnaire data, statistical methods and software were employed to calculate averages, percentages, and correlations. This allowed for an overview of key trends and patterns in education, employment, and health among women in the village.
- Qualitative Analysis: Data from one-on-one interviews and field observations was subjected to thematic analysis. This qualitative approach aimed to identify recurring themes and narratives, providing deeper insights into the experiences and perspectives of the women in Barchandra Village.

The integration of both quantitative and qualitative data was vital in providing a comprehensive understanding of the socio-economic status of women in the village, acknowledging not only the statistical trends but also the underlying stories and voices of the participants. This extended methodology section provides more information about the sampling strategy and data collection process, emphasizing the importance of a comprehensive approach to capture the complexity of the socio-economic status of women in Barchandra Village.

GENERAL FINDINGS

- The Dominant religion in the village is Hinduism.
- Education Qualifications of women ranges from High Secondary Pass to 8th Standard.
- The women have faced numerous challenges in their life.
- They don't feel any gender biasness in their family.
- They are not satisfied with the amenities of childcare in the village. They hardly receive any amenities form Government.
- While some women are active in Women Empowerment Initiative, others are not.
- Most of the women in the village are housewife.
- They feel there are still exists some orthodox perspective in their community towards women.
- They have savings account.
- They like to spend their leisure time by doing gardening, handloom, weaving and other household activities.
- They are aware about their family income.
- They think that education is important.
- Most of the women in village are not aware about the various Government Schemes.
- Most of the women are engaged in Agricultural work.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Awareness Campaigns on Government Schemes: Conducting awareness campaigns, workshops, and information dissemination programs to ensure that women in the village are well-informed about various government schemes and initiatives designed to support their socio-economic development.
- Access to Childcare Amenities: Advocating for improved childcare amenities within the village and lobby for government support in this regard. Collaborate with local authorities to provide safe and accessible childcare options to enable women to pursue employment opportunities and personal development.
- Encourage Women Empowerment Initiatives: Promoting and expanding women empowerment initiatives in the village. Create opportunities for skill development and entrepreneurship to enable women to actively participate in income-generating activities and reduce their financial dependence.
- Education Enhancement: Recognizing the importance of education and encouraging women to pursue further studies or skill-based training. Support initiatives to improve the quality of education within the village, ensuring it is accessible and relevant to women's needs and aspirations.
- Promote Gender Sensitization: Organizing workshops and awareness programs aimed at addressing and eliminating the lingering orthodox perspectives within the community. Encourage more inclusive and equitable gender roles and relationships.
- Promote Savings and Financial Literacy: Continuing to encourage women to maintain savings accounts and enhance financial literacy. Promote the benefits of savings, investment, and financial planning to empower women to make informed decisions about their finances.
- Diversify Employment Opportunities: Collaborating with local authorities and non-governmental organizations to create diverse employment opportunities beyond agriculture. Explore initiatives like vocational training and job placement programs to reduce women's financial dependence.
- Support and Strengthen Women's Networks: Facilitating the formation of women's networks and self-help groups to provide a support system for women in the village. These networks can serve as platforms for sharing knowledge, experiences, and resources.
- Regularly Evaluate Progress: Implement regular assessments and reviews to measure the impact of these recommendations. This ongoing monitoring will help adapt strategies to address the evolving needs of women in the village effectively.
- Collaborate with Local Authorities and NGOs: Engaging in collaborative efforts with local authorities, non-governmental organizations, and educational institutions to ensure the effective implementation of these recommendations and improve the overall socio-economic status of women in Barchandra Village.

By implementing these recommendations, it is possible to promote women's empowerment, improve their access to education and healthcare, and create a more inclusive and equitable environment within the village. These initiatives will contribute to enhancing the socio-economic status of women in Barchandra Village, Assam, and lead to more sustainable and holistic development in the community.
